REMEMBERING BROTHER JOHN WASHUTA

Brother John Washuta passed away on September 9, 2008 at the age of 85. Brother Washuta worked at General Motors for 34 years. He served our membership for several years as the GM Unit Plant Chairperson in the 1970s and as UAW Local 199 President from 1976 to 1979.



I first saw Brother Washuta speak at a rally in Montebello Park on October 14, 1976 on the occasion of the Canada-wide work stoppage to protest the Trudeau government's anti-worker wage controls program. Brother Washuta spoke as the president of UAW Local 199 and shared the stage with then St. Catharines and District Labour Council President and Local 199 icon Gordon Lambert.

I knew Brother Washuta as a member of St. Catharines City Council for many years representing my ward. His son Greg subsequently replaced him holding the same position on City Council. In doing so, Greg continued the tradition of his father in being a voice supportive of organized labour.

Brother John Washuta's time on City Council and his time holding top leadership positions in Local 199 comprised an exceptional record of service to members of Local 199 and to our community. We are indebted to him for all of his contributions. He will be missed.



President's Report by Wayne Gates

he Executive Board of Local 199 unanimously supported our Financial Secretary-Treasurer Malcolm Allen for M.P. of the Welland riding. The result was Malcolm being elected as the new NDP/M.P. of the riding. Malcolm couldn't have won without the tremendous support of the active and retired members of Local 199. The entire membership would like to congratulate Malcolm and thank him for his many years as an elected skilled trades rep. in the

plant and his 8 $\frac{1}{2}$ years as Financial Secretary-Treasurer of our local. We believe Malcolm is the best person to represent the communities of the Welland riding. We look forward to working closely with our CAW M.P. on issues that are important to our active and retired members, our communities and families. Some of these issues will be our jobs, pensions and health care.

AROUND THE LOCAL

NEPTUNUS YACHTS INC.

For the last year we have watched as the company has laid off all of our members of this unit. At this facility the members build luxury yachts which sold for between 1.5 and 3 million dollars. (See photos below) The quality and productivity of our highly skilled workforce at Neptunus was excellent.

We had a number of issues with this employer over the last year. The employer had a downturn in

sales due to the increase in value of the Canadian dollar. As a result, in March 2008 the employer implemented its final layoff of employees and it ceased operations.

We filed our grievances on behalf of our members at Neptunus: Remit to the union dues deducted from the employees pay cheques.

Forward to the benefit carrier Great West Life monies deducted from employees pay cheques to cover their share of the cost of premiums for benefit coverage for the first three (3) months of their layoff.

Pay termination pay in lieu of providing notice of termination of certain employees laid off in 2008, pursuant to Section 57 and 61 of the Employment Standard Act. (ESA)

Pay severance to employees who were laid off and who had five (5) years of service with the employer pursuant to Section 64 and 65 of the ESA.

These four grievances went to arbitration and the grievances were upheld; and the employer was ordered to pay:

\$6,934.48 to be paid to Local 199 for non-remittance of union dues.

\$16,500 for non-remittance of monies deducted for benefit coverage.



\$298,767.20 for failure to pay termination pay in lieu of notice of termination to the relevant employees pursuant to Section 57 and 61 of the ESA.

\$350,691.89 for failure to pay severance owed to the relevant employees pursuant to Section 64 and 65 of the ESA.

I would like to thank the membership of Neptunus for their support. I would also like to thank Chairperson Randy Wedler and National Representative Doug Orr. Without their support and hard work, this award wouldn't have happened.

BRUNNER MANUFACTURING

Early in the bargaining process, the company tabled concessionary demands that included a two-tier wage structure, co-pay for healthcare benefits, changes to classification wage table and no language changes. The company told us they had lost money over the past two (2) years and cited intense competition, a slowing of the U.S. economy, the rapid rise of the Canadian dollar and increase cost of steel and oil. We didn't dispute an unhealthy business environment exists. Forming a collective agreement in today's environment poses significant challenges. I'm proud to report the bargaining committee resisted all concessionary demands of the employer. We are also proud to report we have a new three (3) year collective agreement which maintains our health care benefits, improves wages throughout the life of the agreement and addresses an important issue to our members that management would cease. Performing bargaining unit work as well as strengthening job posting language and the grievance procedure. The membership ratified the new three (3) year collective agreement by 88%.

I would like to thank the bargaining committee of Bob Lohrke-Chairperson, Tim Koop and Bruce Burke-Committeepersons, and CAW National Rep. Doug Orr.

NIAGARA MOTORS

We have a new three (3) year collective agreement at Niagara Motors. The bargaining committee would like to thank our members for their patience and support during difficult and extended contract negotiations.

We also want to thank the members for your strong strike vote which assisted our committee in being able to make additional improvements to the contract in the final hours of bargaining. The ratification vote was 76%. Highlights: improved vacation entitlement, improved bereavement leave, improved prescription glasses and vision care, improved health and safety, increased company paid portion of benefits, increased wages (2% per year of agreement). There was also a signing bonus.

I would like to thank chairperson Rob Kocis, committeeperson Laura Mark and National rep. Mike Menicanin for the hard work at the bargaining table.

IAFRATE MACHINE WORKS

The bargaining committee expected this round of bargaining to be remarkably difficult due to external economic factors. The high Canadian dollar, price increases in steel and of course, continued reduction of plant volumes creased a perfect storm. The employer tabled concessionary proposals to take away the vacation bonus, create a co-pay benefit structure and reduce in plant representation. The bargaining committee resisted all company concessions and have agreed to a one (1) year collective agreement which maintains wages and benefits at today's level and language changes that will enhance our member's rights in the plant.

I would like to thank chairperson Darren Perkin, committeepersons Kurt Dollinger and Kevin Juras for their commitment to their membership in a tough economic time.

I would also like to thank Gary Bradnam who filled in during the bargaining process when I was off work. Gary is the unit chairperson of all the other units of Local 199. The membership of Iafrate ratified the collective agreement by 100%.

THE GLOBAL ECONOMY

o no one's surprise, a recent census report indicates that the pro-business free trade policies of the past 25 years have seriously damaged the economic well being of most Canadians.

Despite assurances from a gaggle of so-called experts, our economy is **not** fundamentally sound. The bailouts from Wall Street for corporations, and the nationalization of banks in the world's

dominate capitalist country (once thought a mockery just a few short months ago) have now become a reality.

Because of failure of the global financial system, an opportunity for working people to re-assert

ourselves as vital to the recovery of our economy genuinely exists. No longer can western countries decree the only way to prosperity is through the market. For the past quarter century, this neo liberal model has been the dominant force in the global economic forum and as a result, we have witnessed good paying jobs lost in all sectors most notably in manufacturing. Economists of all stripes agree that between 400,000 to 500,000 manufacturing jobs have left Canada for foreign

shores. To make matters worse government policy on trade and investment has allowed the unprecedented sale of our natural resources



and domestic businesses. What this means is our raw materials are exported very cheaply and then imported back as expensive finished product with the profits



staying off shore, providing little or no benefit for Canadians.

All is not doom and gloom however. As I stated earlier, government has taken dramatic action to

save the financial sector. These same governments can intervene just as drastically in the rest of our economy. A minority federal government in Canada allows us to get our agenda back on the table. Our government

INJURED WORKERS MUST BE ON POLITICAL AGENDA

AVOID PRESCRIPTION CO-PAYS

Workers with occu-

pational injuries who have had WSIB claims allowed for them are entitled to receive health care benefits and can have prescription medications prescribed for your occupational injuries paid for by the WSIB without co-pays. As long as medical findings provided by your treating physician demonstrate the need for these medications workers with occupational injuries not only do not need to pay the co-pays required in their employee benefit plans they should not. If you have an occupational injury get your treating physician to submit a written request for the needed prescriptions supported by medical findings and citing the applicable WSIB Claim number.

MALCOLM ALLEN

Malcolm Allen's election as the new NDP MP for the

Welland- Thorold riding marked a historic accomplishment. It was the first time a member of Local 199 has been elected to either federal or provincial political office. During the election campaign I had the privilege of speaking at a campaign rally in Welland along with CAW National President Ken Lewenza in which I addressed the fact that workers need political leadership who know which side they are on and who is there with us. I look forward to seeing Malcolm Allen provide that kind of principled and focused political leadership in Ottawa.

JOHN DEERE CLOSURE

When John Deere announced the clo-

sure of its Welland Works in 2009 it said that the move would achieve a significant cost savings and improve its financial results. John Deere emphasized that, "The strong Canadian dollar continues to make this business financially challenging."

The Welland Works were not losing money. Since the closure announcement the market value of the Canadian dollar has dropped sharply meaning the operating costs of the Welland Works have also dropped sharply. Yet the plant is still being closed and neither the federal nor the provincial governments are trying to stop the closure of this plant.

The inaction of these governments under these circumstances and considering the devastating

human consequences the closure will have is nothing less than criminal negligence. What is more this situation demonstrates yet again that if we had strong provincial plant closure legislation which makes corporations truly accountable to their workers and our communities the devastating consequences of plant closures like this could be avoided.

In addition this particular closure demonstrates that the market value of the Canadian dollar is in some cases little more than a convenient excuse being used to conceal corporate greed and the relentless corporate drive to maximize profits with absolutely no regard for the human consequences.

CANDIDATE'S DEBATE

I recently attended a debate between the

four candidates to replace Howard Hampton as the next ONDP leader. At the debate I questioned the candidates as to why the WSIB is so intensely disliked and what they felt needed to be done to put an end to the countless outrages perpetrated against injured workers in Ontario. The candidates' answers were all generally good and showed substantial familiarity with issues of concern to injured workers and their organizations. This illustrated the fact that the NDP is considerably better on injured workers' issues than the Liberals never mind the Tories.

Nonetheless it was no less clear to me that had I not posed my question about injured workers issues and Ontario's workers compensation, legislation would never have been discussed at the debate. This mirrors the fact that the concerns of injured workers are never seriously addressed during Ontario election campaigns and very few people raise them between those campaigns. This represents an inexcusable failure on the part of both the labour leadership and on the part of injured workers and their organizations to force these issues to the front of the political agenda in this province. This must change. But it will not change until injured workers become politically engaged in

a serious way and become a force to be reckoned with that both politicians and labour leaders will ignore at their own peril.

will be retiring January 1st 2009. Representing the membership and working with the leadership of Local 199 has been a great pleasure. The knowledge and experience gained was priceless.

We wish everyone the same opportunity to retire with good fortune & good health.

THE LAST WORD: With the company's plans to exit work, the future of the Ontario St. Plant looks

bleaker every day. This does not mean that the Health & Safety of those still working has to be put in jeopardy. General Motors has always committed that the "HEALTH & SAFETY of its employees is the company's OVERRID-ING PRIORITY". It is up to all of you who are still working to ensure that

General Motors lives up to its commitment.

Over the years we have endeavored to resolve the Health & Safety concerns with our goal of eliminating the hazards in the workplace. Like our predecessors, we have been very successful in that respect and have also been successful with having strong contract language written that protects everyone. None of this would be possible without the collective support of you the membership and for that, we thank you.

Listed below are the some of the main concerns or hazards that you must insist are kept in check in order to maintain a safe and healthy workplace.

Guarding on machinery is proper and in place, energy control procedures are up to date, metalworking fluids are maintained in good condition, air suction systems and their filters function when equipment is operating, fresh air units are supplying fresh air, slippery floor conditions and trip hazards are not present, preventative maintenance checks by skilled trades are completed on time,

> temperature of work areas are no less than 64 degrees Fahrenheit and that lighting not cause shadows or glare and be sufficient for the type of work.

> Lastly, if you have a concern that anything in the workplace is a hazard that may harm you, take your

concern to your supervisor for immediate elimination of the hazard, if the supervisor fails to protect you, exercise your right to refuse to continue working until it is safe to do so, also if you feel you have been exposed to a hazard and that it is affecting your health in some way, report it to the Medical department so it is documented and shows there is a potential problem in any given area.

CHRISTMAS: We wish you and your families all the best during the holiday season.

Remember, if it can't be done safely, it can't be done!

n our last article we referred the 2008 Women's Conference attended members of our committee in August. The conference theme was "Equality Once and for All!!"

It was very disturbing to learn about the blatant economic inequality induced by our Federal government. Prime Minister Harper has proven to be anything but a supporter to the cause of Canadian women and children. His cuts to a planned

universal childcare program and the 3.7 billion dollars cut in Children's programs will have a detrimental effect on all Canadians. Harper and his government have also cut 5 million in funding to women's

programs and closed 12 of 16 Status of Women's offices across Conservatives Canada. The believe women are equal within our great country and that these services are redundant. This we know is completely untrue; currently 2.4 million women and over 1 million children live in poverty and need these services more now than ever.

White women earn 70 cents on every dollar that a man earns outside of a union. Women of colour and immigrant women earn 64 cents and even more appalling aboriginal women earn 42 cents. On average, women working full time earn 29.5% less than men. As long as women, aboriginal people and workers of colour can't access higher paying jobs: as long as some jobs continue to be undervalued in our society: and as long as some sectors remain largely non-unionized the wage gaps will continue. Recently, a breakfast was host-


ed by the Coalition to End Violence against Women Forum. CEVAW's "motto" is to Stand Up, Speak out on Family Violence Own it, and End it. This organization consists of agencies from within the community who deal with women and child abuse and violence. There were

displays from various agencies and guest speakers within the CEVAW coalition.

We held our annual December 6th Commemoration Breakfast paying tribute to the 14 young women who were senselessly murdered at L'Ecole Polytechnique in Montreal simply because of their gender. This year we focused on the current

Violence Against Women situation. Please refer to the Stats Canada 2006 report on Family Violence

Canada for dismore turbing facts. There were



dents of spousal violence reported to police: 84% of victims were women. Over a ten-vear period men were more likely to be the perpetrators of spousal violence. In Chronic abuse 97% of the respondents were men. The 2005 Annual report to the chief coroner concluded that domestic violence fatalities are not gender- neutral events. Of the 100 cases they examined during 2002 to 2005; 93% of the victims were women. Those 1 in 4 women will be a victim of an assault in their life.

Our committee will continue to focus on ending all violence and how we as a society can achieve this goal.

ovember 11, 2008, Remembrance Day is an anniversary of sacrifice that could arguably be called the most significant single day in Canada's history. This is the one day

every year that unites all Canadians coast to coast in tribute to those that gave their lives in service to our country stretching from World War 1 to the present day.

Canada in 1914-1918 had a population of about 6-7 million. A staggering 68,000 of our young men died in that war, described by many at the time as

"the war to end all wars". My great grandfather was one of those lost. A man I never knew, but his memory lives on through medals, and a silver cross along with photos and memorabilia passed down through generations. This is not uncommon in many Canadian families, only the time and dates change. These are the ashes of war.

This year was different however with a very dramatic and impressive ceremony of commemoration of Canada's sacrifice in World War 1. On the evening of November 4th the Queen unveiled a transatlantic war memorial in London, titled "Vigil 1914-1918." The names of the 68,000 Canadians killed were projected one by one on to the side of Canada House in Trafalgar Square. Each name appeared for 8 seconds and continued on subsequent nights until completion November 11th at sunrise. After it appeared in London every name was then projected in various cities across Canada appearing at the same local time in each location. Beginning on the East Coast in Halifax these names then appeared in Fredericton, the



University of New Brunswick, then to the National War Memorial in Ottawa and then westward to all major cities

across Canada. This amazing project created by Toronto actor R.H. Thomson and lighting designer

Martin Convoy, thus symbolizes the soldier's silent return

home.



large and small will have their own ceremonies, not glorifying war, but in recognition of the tremendous cost to our country. As Kofi Amin, former Secretary General of the United Nations said, "War is the ultimate failure of diplomacy".

Locally, dedication services were held at many Royal Canadian Legion Branches. I attended the very moving service held by Branch 613 on Hwy 20 in Fonthill. This commemorates, the memory of those who gave their lives in all our wars while serving over the years. Plaques were donated by local families and featured within the enclosure is a magnificent Peace Garden, which is well worth a visit at any time. You will always be made welcome. Congratulations to Gerald Berkout and his committee for promoting this fine project.

This all illustrates the real cost of war, the human cost. As our casualties continue to mount in Afghanistan it was note worthy to see the statement of the General in command of the British troops, that the Afghanistan mission is unwinnable. The Brits have at least three times the number of troops serving in the southern area of Hellamond Province along side our Canadian forces.
